Behind the Scenes: The Terrapin Conservation Project


Tuesday, March 12, 6:45 pm at the Barrington Public Library

BARRINGTON, RI – Every year in late spring, a miraculous thing happens in a remote corner of Barrington, RI. Hundreds of rare Diamondback Terrapin turtles come ashore to lay their eggs, ensuring the survival of their species for another generation. Just as remarkable are the dozens of volunteers who spend hours preparing for their arrival.

Learn about this project at an event hosted by the Barrington Land Conservation Trust and Barrington Public Library. "Behind the Scenes: The Terrapin Conservation Project," takes place on Tuesday, March 12, at 6:45 pm in the Salem Family Auditorium at the Library, 281 County St., Barrington.

The event is part of the 2024 Land Trust Learning Series, sponsored by Santander Bank, with additional support from Prickly Ed's Cactus Patch Native Plant Emporium, Bank Newport, and the RI Natural History Survey, and other local sponsors.

At this event, you'll hear directly from volunteers who greet the nesting turtles, protect their nests, watch the hatchlings emerge, and scientifically track the results of each season. The project draws volunteers of all ages and backgrounds, including college students interested in pursuing a career in environmental studies.

Kathryn Beauchamp and Madeleine Linck, co-leaders of the Terrapin Conservation Project, will be joined by other long-time volunteers who have invested heart and soul — along with a lot of sweat equity — in the project. Volunteers will share their experiences, answer questions, and provide a glimpse into the daily activities of a Terrapin Conservation Project volunteer.

"When you go through a whole season, there's such a reward when you see those tiny, perfectly formed little babies," says volunteer Nancy Maddocks, a retired librarian from the Barrington Middle School. "They're incredible. It gives you hope that nature still persists. It's exciting to think that here in little suburban Barrington, this exists. I feel a sense of pride that there's a decent-sized community who really cares about nature and is trying to preserve it."

Mary Caplan, who spent 30 years as a nurse at RI Hospital, became an active volunteer when she retired. "I'm outside with like-minded people who care about the environment. We're doing something positive. It's scientifically interesting, and we see the benefit when the babies are born. We look in each little cage and their little faces peek up. They're saying, let me go. Let me do my thing."

Deb Matson, whose career in social work led her into many volunteer activities, now divides her time between the Barrington Farm School and the Terrapin Conservation Project. "What has been the most meaningful is to witness the mother turtles coming in late spring to lay their eggs and watching the little baby hatchlings emerge in late summer. It's a miracle and we are all relieved to see them coming out of their nest and healthy! No words can describe the feeling. You have to experience it. Volunteering here, interacting with nature, has given me a deepened respect and humility towards all of wildlife. I truly have grown."

The evening will conclude with a 20-minute documentary, "Turtles on the Hill," a love story about this population of rare turtles, the dedicated people who are conserving them, and the changing coastal landscapes that they share. The documentary is told through the eyes of a young woman scientist who joined this community to reveal how—despite the existential threats of coastal development, predation, and sea level rise—the lives of the people, the Diamondback Terrapins, and the estuary are inextricably intertwined.

The movie is written and directed by Carolyn Decker, and produced & edited by Jason Jaacks. It is a Splitframe Media production produced in partnership with the Science & Story Lab at the University of Rhode Island.

The Barrington Land Conservation Trust has preserved nearly 300 acres of open space in perpetuity for the benefit of the public. For more information on the Land Trust and its properties, visit <u>www.blct.org</u>.

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Life in the Marsh

Knee deep in the rising tide The Great White Egret stands Neck stretched tall, Alert to his dinner streaming past.

His elegant stillness against Green salt marsh grasses Is reflected in undulating motion On the incoming tide.

How does he know That the tastiest morsel is yet to come? His still body tells me - patience. Time does not exist. Only this moment.

Atop a platform in the salt marsh An osprey pair have raised four chicks Now fledged, flying haphazardly, Practicing landings and misses To a symphony of high-pitched twitters From watchful parents And themselves.

Imagine! Four fledglings! Almost unheard of. Ospreys have a hard life. Defects of birth, accidents, starvation If your siblings are bigger and greedier.

This year the osprey parents are notably anxious As they instruct and guide their fledglings Adult in size, still teenagers in know-how, Not yet equipped to survive on their own,

Learning to pierce the depths of the cove with Laser sharp eyes for tiny, darting mummichogs, Or a telltale flick of grass on the upland That signals a field mouse No larger than my thumb.

Last year was a bad year For these elegant, resourceful virtuosos. They lost two of three fledglings. Do raptors' hearts break?

They are anxious, impatient birds, Hunting, feeding, escaping their own predators -The quarrelsome squadrons of crows Who dive bomb the nests for food. There is no patience in the perilous skies. Yet, the parents return every year To the same nesting spot, Repair the nest, Begin again.

And the Great White Egrets who sometimes Greet each other with a gentle brush of beaks? They, too, return Year after year.
