

Land Trust Series Hosts Climate Change Conversation

The Barrington Land Conservation Trust kicks off its 2025 Learning Series on Tuesday, March 4, at 7 pm, with a big-picture look at how we think and talk about climate change. This free event will take place in the Salem Family Auditorium at the Barrington Public Library. To register, visit www.blct.org/events.

Heather Goldstone, Chief Communication Officer of the Woodwell Climate Research Center, will lead a presentation and discussion on "Seeing the Forest Through the Trees." The talk will address common questions and misconceptions about climate change and present a realistic, empowering framing of our climate challenge—the scope of the problem and the kinds of solutions we need.

"Climate change is full of paradoxes," says Goldstone. "The need for action is urgent, and yet, true success is a long game. The accumulation of greenhouse gases is supercharging both droughts and downpours, fires and floods. It is a global phenomenon with intensely local impacts."

The Land Trust Learning Series is a year-long program of free environmental education presentations. All ages are welcome and there is no residency restriction.
