



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2025 Poetry Initiative Judges

Tina Cane, this year's Final Judge, was born in Hell's Kitchen, NYC in 1969 and grew up in the city's East and West Village. She attended the University of Vermont, the Sorbonne and completed her master's degree in French Literature at the University of Paris X-Nanterre and Middlebury College. She is the founder and director of Writers-in-the Schools, RI, for which she works as a visiting poet. Over the past twenty-five years, Tina has taught French, English, and creative writing in public and private schools throughout New York City and Rhode Island. Her poems and translations have appeared in numerous publications, including American Poetry Review, Spinning Jenny, Poetry, The Literary Review, Tupelo Quarterly, The Common, Texas Review, and Poem-a-Day. Her work, The Fifth Thought, was the 2008 Other Painters Press chapbook winner.

Carol Anderheggen is a member of Ocean State Poets whose mission is to bring the joy of poetry to unserved and underserved venues in Rhode Island. She also serves as their web master. Her personal website is carolmaeray.com. Carol's poetry has appeared in numerous regional publications and several national publications (Newport Life, A Letter Among Friends, NEARI Bylines, Hope Center for Cancer Support, RI Breast Cancer Coalition, Northeast Journal, Anemone, URI Women, The Great Swamp Gazette, Edison Literary Review, Evening Street Review.) She attended, by invitation only, a weekend workshop with Galway Kinnell and a second one with Sharon Olds, both sponsored by the Redwood Library in Newport, RI. In addition, Carol attended and worked at the Frost Festival of Poetry in Franconia, NH for seven summers. She taught a poetry workshop at Salve Regina University in Newport, RI for ten years. Her current focus is running poetry workshops for our special needs population. Finishing Line Press published her first chapbook, Writing Down Cancer, in 2015 and a second chapbook, Born-Child, in 2017.

Lawrence J. Krips is the father of two delightful daughters and grandfather to three grand offsprings. He is an evolution (i.e., empowerment) coach, gatherings leader and poet. A founding member of Ocean State Poets, contributor to the Origami Poetry Project, Larry's poetry has appeared in *Poetry of Men, Tifferet, Writers' Circle* (receiving an Artistic Merit Award), *Rhode Island Writers' Circle Anthology, Love's Chance Magazine, The Open Door* (of NYC ARE), 50 Haikus, New Verse News, The Best of Kindness II Anthology and Under the 13th Star Anthology. He has read In Rhode Island, New York City and Connecticut, appeared on TV's Good News Rhode Island, started the musical group Mouthpeace, performing also with Thunder and The Bird. His poem Yahrzeit received a Pushcart Prize nomination. A Soul's Way . . . Soulspeak was published by Hallowed Abyss and is also available as a cd.
