



Newport: free for the entire pilot

Bristol: \$50 first year

Barrington: \$66.66 first year

You get a starter kit, weekly curbside pickup, finished compost, and deep discounts for two years. No yard or experience required.

One family's 6 pounds is minor. A neighborhood participating together measurably improves local environmental impact.

If your leftovers are headed for the trash, redirect them.

Pugnacious Leafcutter Bee

Peace and Plenty Community Garden in Providence hosted three seasonal mini-BioBlitzes in 2025, made possible by a grant from Bloom Rhode Island.

What is a BioBlitz you ask?

A BioBlitz is an event where scientists, environmentalists and community members come together to find and identify as many living species as possible in a specific area. In the 1/3 acre of Peace and Plenty Community Garden, 340 total species were discovered. These findings, tabulated and verified by Melissa Guillot of 15 Minute Field Trips, demonstrate how vibrant and valuable our often overlooked urban green spaces are in Rhode Island's ecosystem.

Notable Findings...

It was verified that during the second Bioblitz on July 12 that a species of bee was identified, which had not been previously identified in Rhode Island, the *Pugnacious Leafcutter Bee*. Yellow jackets were also filmed eating a Spotted Lanternfly!
